We are now in September, and I'm sorry to say this, with only three months to go before Christmas. So now is the time to start to plan for the Christmas season.

Last year I developed a Christmas workshop aimed at anyone who

workshop aimed at anyone who knew how to make a Dorset Cartwheel Button. I started to design this project this time last year and it took a while to figure out how to teach this button in a short time span. I only had three hours. But we

managed. I called this project my
Four Dorset Button Christmas Tree.
The tree was made up of four
separate Dorset Buttons. The first
two where standard Cartwheel
buttons and the two largest rings I
worked with beads.
Now all I must do is think of

something for this year. I'm planning to offer both online and face to face workshops. Both will take place from my studio. But thinking about what to do, I may well offer this lovely tree button this Christmas. The two top buttons are ideal for a beginner and all four can be worked and assembled after the workshop. Now I come to think about it, this happened last Christmas. What I did enjoy was to see images of their finished trees.

Another idea is to make a sparkly 6cm button using threads and ribbon from participants own 'stash' and turn it into a brooch. These Dorset Buttons would make lovely presents.

# The joy of the Dorset 'Singleton' Button

Dorset Buttons fall into four categories. The first two, High Tops and Dorset Knobs, thought to

be the first Dorset **Buttons** and made with sheep's horn, fabric and thread. These were followed by Birdseye and Mites which used just fabric and thread. Wire rings were introduced in the 1730s and two further types of buttons were added to the range, the thread buttons known as Dorset Cartwheels and Blandford

Crosswheels which were worked used wire rings and thread. Finally, the Singleton buttons which used wire rings, fabric and thread

I can't understand why the
Singleton button is not as well
known as the thread buttons.
They are versatile and I have
used them on many projects. They
are simple to make and the
original buttons featured a few

simple embroidery stitches on the top.

I have been unable to discover when theses buttons first came under the Dorset Button range but I have seen them on original items of clothing dating back to the early 1800s. Another thought is that they were named after the family who started to make them, the Singleton family, who lived in and around Lytchett Minster. In the early 1900s, when Lady Florence Lees started her mission in the village a photograph of her sitting in the front of the workers and staff. Standing next to Lady Lees is a woman holding her son, Nick Singleton.

A Note to the above: Just as I'm unsure as to the history or context of this, I'm not entirely sure how to structure it. It seems like the first half should be part of the prior sentence and then the remaining a caption for an image? i.e "Another thought is that they were named after the family who started to make them, the Singleton family, who lived in and around Lytchett Minster in the early 1900s, when Lady Florence

Lees started her mission in the village.

As I have mentioned, I have used these buttons for a number of projects. The way they are constructed can be adapted in a variety of ways. The simple embroidery in the centre of the button lends itself to ornate embellishment; the fabric covering the button can be printed using your own design on prepared fabric using a home printer and can also be doubled up using lace as an over lay. But whichever method, I always stay close to the way the original buttons were constructed.

I hope I have encouraged you to experiment making these buttons and I look forward to receiving your images. If you are interested in learning how to make these buttons, I am running an online course in November. Details can be found on the back page of this eNewsletter.

first? Do I prepare the order for our local museum at the top of Gold Hill in Shaftesbury or restock my Etsy shop with metal rings as I see I've run out of many of the sizes I have on offer? Both must be completed by tomorrow.

I must frame a piece of work I finished in August. Then make twelve 40cm buttons with black and white beads for the centre of my poppy broches for this year.

Waiting in the corner of my studio there is that 30cm button I started earlier in the year which I'm working in vintage silks just waiting to be finished. Oh yes, I forgot to mention that I want to experiment with foiling to use as a background for one of my 30cm button completed earlier in the year.

The list seems to be endless. What are your Dorset Button projects? I expect many of you also have this problem!
